THE APOSTOLIC PREACHING OF THE CROSS. By Leon Morris. Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co., Grand Rapids, Michigan, 1955. 296 pp. \$3.50.

This book grew out of the desire of the author, who is vice-principal of Ridley College, Melbourne, to discover what was in the minds of the apostles when they used such words as redeem, covenant, propitiate, and justify.

To do this the author examines the contributions of the Old Pestament,

Jewish literature, andegreek usage both within and outside the New Testament.

The sacatsful result is a detailed, thorough, scholarly, and refreshing study of the doctrine of the atonement.

The subjects discussed are redemption, covenant, blood, propitiation, reconciliation, and justification. The precent is thorough including references to older stendard works and newer writings. The results are innecessfiw tandada out the state of Scripture. But it is the spirit of the discussion which cannot help but inpress the reader.

While the author presents all views with scholarly objectivity and fairness, he does not hesitate to press his conclusions and to insist that the Bible these conclusions must be allowed to speak for itself. If this contradicts current theasings of liberalism (and all of his conclusions do), Dr. Morris does not hesitate to make that clear. This is a book for serious students and one that gives a certain sound for substitutionary atonement.

Although the careful study of every chapter will reap profit to the reader, the reviewer was especially struck with the discussion of the concepts of blood and justification. The discussion of the wrath of God was also especially fine. Some, however, will not agree with the author's conclusion that reconciliation involves a change on the part of God as well as man. The usefulness of the book is enhanced by three complete indexes as well as by the placing of the footnotes at the bottom of each page.
