THEOLOGY 159

- Purpose: To review thoroughly the major fields of theology (including contemporary) with special attention to problems and literature in these fields. This course also aims to prepare for the written comprehensive exams in theology.
- Requirements: Students will be prepared to discuss in detail, defend, debate and wrestle with questions on areas of theology in the following order:
 - Prolegomena, Bibliology, history of the canon, history of modern dispensationalism.
 - 2. Theology Proper, Trinitarian controversies
 - 3. Angelology, Anthropology, Hamartiology, Pelagian controversy
 - 4. Soteriology, history of that doctrine
 - 5. Ecclesiology, history of covenant theology
 - 6. Eschatology, history of that doctrine
 - 7. Christology, history of that doctrine
 - 8. Pneumatology, history of that doctrine
 - 9. Existentialism, Kierkegaard
 - 10. Neoorthodoxy
 - 11. Rauschenbusch, Schweitzer, Tillich
 - 12. Bultmann, Cullmann, German scholars
 - 13. C.H. Dodd, Teilhard
 - 14. Identification of contemporary scholars

A bibliography of six to ten books should be prepared for each area.
